A bowl and several pieces of stem of this type found at Steyning, 1950-52. However, owing to incompleteness of pieces and mis-spelling of Chichester as CHICESTER the inscription was mistakenly thought to be STEPHEN LEICESTER, until finding of another piece, 12.1.67.
