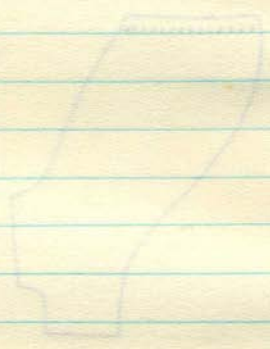
Relief

The mark reads backwards on these pipes owing to an error of engraving by the die cutter presumably.

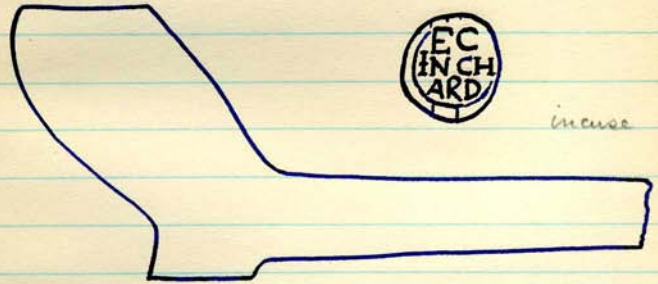
