More upright than previous types still retaining the nailed rim but with a lighter and more delicate bowl.
During 1680-1710

A further refinement of 12, the bowl becoming more slender and the shape more open, the rim still retaining the nailed rim.
During 1680-1720

Very upright narrow bowl with thick walls and small rim. For example, all apparently from the same mould.
During 1690-1720

Slender bowl with rim parallel to the sides and sharply defined upper chamber walls and narrower rim. *During 1700-20*

Larger bowl, more open bowl shape, the bowl becoming more slender. The chamber walls are more defined in the design and better marked. *During 1710-1800*

Very large bowl bowl. With the advent of the nineteenth century the pipe bowl became smaller, the bowl becoming more slender and often carrying the maker's initials in large and letter, one side and *During 1800-1850*

GLOUCESTER PIPE MAKERS

And rs	P	Pipes of Type 13 marked on the side of the bowl P.A. and P. AND RS are found in quantity in Gloucester; both are also recorded from Stroud. Philip Andrews who had children baptised at St. Nicholas Gloucester between 1728 and 1733 could be the maker. ³
Arnold	Thomas	Recorded in 1847, ⁴ living in Brothers Place.
Briant	Frank	Recorded in 1879, ⁵ at Foundry Street, and 1889 ⁶ at 48 Sweet Briar Street.
Brimyard	Henry	Son of William Brimyard III, took freedom of the city on 8 October 1703. ⁷
Briant	John	1879 living in Foundry Street. ⁸
Brimyard	John	Son of William Brimyard III, took freedom of the city in 1706.
Bower	John	Son of Samuel Bower I, took freedom of the city on 28 August 1727. Deceased by 26 March 1761, when his son Samuel took freedom.
Bower	Richard	Son of Samuel Bower II, took freedom on 13 May 1741.

Bower	Samuel	Deceased by 23 December 1726, when his sons Thomas and William took freedom.
Bower	Samuel II	Son of Samuel I, took freedom on 28 August 1727. Deceased by 13 May 1741, when his son Richard took freedom.
Bower	Samuel III	Son of John Bower, took freedom on 26 March 1761. ⁹
Badhams	Hannah	Living in Brothers Place at the time of the 1851 Census aged 27, born Bristol. ¹⁰
Barney	Walter	Took freedom on 23 September 1664.
Barrett	William	Apprenticed to William Swett, took freedom in 1722. Deceased by 1780 when his son Richard, a painter, took freedom. ¹¹
Binley	William	Apprenticed to John Mathews in 1817. ¹²
Brimyard	William	Took apprentices, John and Robert Lane in 1687 and Richard Rathbourne in 1680. Deceased by 21 October 1695 when his son William took freedom.
Brimyard	William II	Took freedom on 21 October 1695. Deceased by 18 May 1702 when his apprentice Richard Puckson took freedom.
Brimyard	William III	Apparently active in 1706 when his son John took freedom. ¹³
Cailer	Elizabeth	Living in Newtown at the time of the 1851 Census; daughter of Sarah Clifford, aged 29, born Bristol St. Philips. ¹⁴
Cowler	Jos	Of Bristol took freedom of the City of Gloucester on 23 May 1741. ¹⁵
Clifford	Sarah	Living in Newtown at the time of the 1851 Census; aged 50, born Bristol St. Philips.
Cotton	Thomas	Living in Northgate Street at the time of the 1851 Census; aged 23, born Bristol. ¹⁶
Cullemore	Thomas	Recorded at his son's apprenticeship in 1664 (Oswald 1960, 66).
Dewy	H & Co.	1879 and 1889, premises in Worcester Street and Westgate Street. ¹⁷
Exton	Thomas	Living in Troy Court at the time of the 1851 Census; aged 39; born Chorley, Lancashire. ¹⁸
George	David	Born 1804, Bristol St. Philips, fathers occupation screw cutter. ¹⁹ Described as labourer at the baptism of his son James at Bristol St. Philips in 1833. ²⁰ Described as pipemaker at the baptism of his daughter at Barton St. Mary, Gloucester, in 1848. ²¹ Premises in Stroud Road in 1844 ²² and 1889. ²³ 1841 Census describes him as retired publican. ²⁴
George	Thomas	Recorded as pipemaker at the baptism of his daughter Maria in 1841, living in the hamlet of Barton St. Mary. ²⁵ This location is consistent with the 1851 Census location of Newtown. ²⁶ He had moved to Paul Street, Tredworth by 1876, ²⁷ and was still recorded at this address in 1879. ²⁸ Born Bristol St. Philips 1824.
Haines	Charles	Living in Hare Lane at the time of the 1851 Census; aged 28, born Gloucester. ²⁹
Haines	Mary	Wife of Charles described as pipetrimmer in the 1851 Census; aged 22, born Bristol. ³⁰
Hicks	Edward	Took freedom of the city on 15 June 1666. Still working in 1702 when his apprentice John Powell took freedom.
Hannis/ Harris	Thomas	Took freedom in February 1703, late apprentice of William Brimyard II defunct.
Herbert	Thomas	Apprenticed to John Smith, took freedom on 26 May 1741. ³¹
Jenkins	James	Described as proprietor of the Birmingham and Sheffield Warehouse, 99 Westgate Street in 1870. ³² With his brother William described as pipemakers at the same address in 1874. ³³ Not listed in 1876. ³⁴

Jenkins	William	See James Jenkins, above.
Legg	Benjamin	Born 1749. ³⁵ Recorded as pipemaker 1820. ³⁶ Died in 1822 leaving in his will, "the whole of my stock in trade", to his son Paul. ³⁷
Lane	John	Apprenticed to William Brimyard in 1666, took freedom in 1678, died in 1682. ³⁸
Legg	Paul	Described as coal merchant in 1820 when his daughter Elizabeth was baptised. ³⁹ In 1820 he is described as an importer of pipe and potters clay and carrier on the Severn. ⁴⁰ That he did take up the manufacture of clay pipes after his fathers death is clearly attested by the marked pipes found in and around the city (Nos. 35, 36 and 37).
Lane	Robert	Apprenticed to William Brimyard I, took freedom on 2 December 1678.
Lambert	Sylvester	Apprenticed to John Moore, took freedom on 22 May 1702. ⁴¹
Lambert	William	Married Anne Tainton on 20 August 1677. Described as pipemaker at the baptism of his son Sylvester in 1695. ⁴²
Mathews	Benjamin	Born 1748, son of Richard and Mary. ⁴³ Took freedom on 1 March 1770. ⁴⁴ Mentioned in the will of his brother Richard in 1800 and he is recipient of Richards working tools and stock in trade. ⁴⁵ Died 1825. ⁴⁶
Mathews	John	Took apprentice W. Binley in 1817. ⁴⁷ He is described as pipemaker in 1820, working in Westgate Street. ⁴⁸ At the baptisms of his children he is variously described as pipemaker in 1822, labourer in 1823 and tanner in 1826. ⁴⁹
Moore	John	His apprentice Sylvester Lambert took freedom on 22 May 1702. ⁵⁰
Mathews	Nicholas	Recorded as pipemaker at the baptism of his son John in 1697. ⁵¹ By the time of his sons apprenticeship to a Bristol glassmaker in 1716 he was deceased (Walker 1973, 139).
Mathews	Richard	Son of Thomas Mathews, took freedom on 28 May 1741, died 1789.
Mathews	Richard II	Son of Richard I, took freedom on 9 June 1780, ⁵² died in 1800 leaving his tools and stock to his brother Benjamin. ⁵³
Mathews	Samuel	Apprenticed to Robert Lane, took freedom on 31 October 1695. ⁵⁴
Mathews	Thomas	Son of Thomas Mathews, took freedom in 1734; no trade entered but at the freedom of his son Richard in 1741 he is described as a pipemaker. ⁵⁵
Norton	William	Recorded in 1847, working in Newtown. ⁵⁶
O'Niel	Edward	A visitor from Boston, Lincolnshire; staying with Thomas Cotton in Northgate Street at the time of the 1851 Census; aged 21, born Boston. ⁵⁷
Puckson	Richard	Apprenticed to William Brimyard II, took freedom on 18 May 1702. ⁵⁸
Priest	George	Born Birstol 1813; working in Columbia Street, Gloucester in 1851 ⁵⁹ and 1856. ⁶⁰ The Census records the birth of his children in Bristol, the youngest in 1847.
Powell	John	Apprentice of Edward Hicks, took freedom on 13 May 1702.
Rathbourne	Richard	Apprentice of William Brimyard, took freedom in 1680.
Reband	Richard	Recorded as pipemaker defunct at the freedom of his son John in 1713.
Reband	John	Son of Richard, took freedom in 1713. ⁶¹
Roberts	Thomas	A visitor from Bristol, staying in Columbia Street at the time of the 1851 Census; aged 40. ⁶²
Santo & Co.		In 1842 and 44 this company was at Black Cloth Yard. ⁶³
Santos	Elizabeth	Premises in Worcester Street recorded in 1839. ⁶⁴

Smith	John	His apprentice Thomas Herbert took freedom on 26 May 1741.
Swett	William	His apprentice William Barrett took freedom in 1722 at which time Swett was deceased. ⁶⁵
Taylor	William	Recorded as pipemaker at the baptisms of his children in 1824, 1826 and 1827. ⁶⁶
Weaver	Thomas	Took freedom on 15 August 1681. ⁶⁷
Williams	Mary Ann	Widow of Robert Williams recorded in 1870. ⁶⁸
Williams	Robert	Recorded in various directories from 1849 to 1866; born 1819 at Hanham.
Young	Abraham	Described as of Ludford in the county of Hereford when his son Walter took the freedom of the City of Gloucester in 1714.
Young	Walter	Son of Abraham, took freedom in 1714. ⁶⁹

Bence	George	Slimbridge. Before 1677. Son apprenticed to a sailor (Walker 1973).

Dower	William	Stroudwater. Before 1644. Son apprenticed to a weaver (Oswald 1960, 68).
Grant	Roger	Westbury on Trym. Married 1694.
Grant	Thomas	Westbury on Trym. Bristol apprentice rolls 1672. ⁷¹
Howson	John	Chipping Campden. Apprenticed to Thomas Smith 1719 (Oswald 1960, 77).
Head	W	Wickwar. Apprenticed to Obadiah Ash 1715 (Oswald 1960, 77).
Lovell	Robert	Wickwar. Pipe 1770–1826. ⁷²
Mason	James	Arwe. Inventory 1691. ⁷³
Perry	I	Coleford. Pipe, c. 1850 (G.M. Coll).
Smith	Edward	Chipping Campden. Land agreement 1813. ⁷⁴
Smith	R	Chipping Campden. Pipe. ⁷⁵
Smith	Thomas	Chipping Campden. Took apprentice J. Howson 1719 (Oswald 1960, 94). Died before September 25th.
Sommers	Thomas	Wickwar. Kinswomans will 1769. ⁷⁶
Walsh	William	Chipping Sodbury. Took apprentice Mary Walsh 1725. ⁷⁷
