The Clay Pipes

There are two bowls and five stem pieces, the two bowls are both early 18th.C in date.

Bowl E614:487, a spurred oval bowl of c.1760-1740, on the right side of the bowl is a single letter 'W' in a circular frame.

Bowl E614:409, a small spurred, oval shaped bowl, no markings, date c.1720-40. There are five stem pieces, one, E614:116 has spiral decoration and dates to the first half of the 18th. Century.


The other stems are plain pieces of the late 17th. to early 18th. Century date.


One stem has markings on the side, the letters 'McDo'..., if this read McDougal then it is Scottish of c.1850-1900; if it read McDowell then it is Dublin made, of same period.
